	 Three sources of income: Annual campaign (primarily from matching): \$107k received out of \$120k expected (v. \$180k in previous two years). Instrumental music: PTSA pays 1/3, Bryant pays 1/3, parents pay 1/3. Currently at \$4500 (30 students paid). 12k expected budget (80 students). Spirit Wear: \$3300 total. We do not make money for spirit wear; we just cover costs (and use small surplus to cover FIN spirit wear). Usually we are 2x this. 	Nelly Goodnoe
7:50	first meeting is just with staff, and then we will include PTSA and LASER in next meeting. • We are identifying what materials we will need to reopen, and it's going to take a lot of planning to prepare to reopen (e.g. some parents who unenrolled will want to reenroll; how to keep students with their same teachers; what does remote instruction look like for students who don't return). • District is meeting with teacher's union to plan the reopening. • We would love to have students back, so are excited to work through this plan. We will share more information as we get it. • If anyone is interested in being part of this planning committee, reach out to Charmaine. We will be continuing to work on this throughout the summer as we prepare for fall as well.	

There is more we as a PTSA can and should be doing as advocacy work. There are concerns from the advocacy co-chairs that we need to work on our anti-racism focus and our role as an advocacy organization. In meetings we run out of time to identify priorities and actions, so there was a proposal to have these important discussions offline as a separate committee meeting in order to encourage more action as a PTSA body.
